SNOW BUSINESS

As the world gets warmer, Europe's ski resorts are making plans for a snowless future.

LEXILE: 1040L (880L alternate reading level)

SOCIAL STUDIES (NCSS) STANDARD: People, Places, and Environments

ENGAGE THE READER

Have students look at the photo at the top of the article and read the headline, “Snow Business.” Ask: What’s happening in the photo? What issue will this article explore? Explain. (Students might figure out that the article is about the ski business, which depends on snow, and that there is little snow on the slopes in the photo.) As they read the article, students should note details that tell them why a snow shortage is a problem for ski resorts.

QUESTIONS FOR CLOSE READING AND DISCUSSION

- What is the central problem the article describes? Why is this problem newsworthy?
- How do you think ski resorts will adapt to warmer winters? Why is adaptation necessary in business?
- According to the article, what role can government play in adapting to change? Why would Italy’s government be interested in saving the country’s ski resorts? Do you agree with Rolando Galli’s proposal to invest in reservoirs? Explain.

EXTEND LEARNING

Challenge students to flex their business acumen by designing a tourism poster for Italy’s ski resorts. Like any effective advertisement, the posters should try to expand on the best qualities of its subject—in this case, Italy’s resorts.

Break students into small groups to generate ideas and create the poster. First, they should confer to respond to these questions: What should be the goals of the Italian ski industry’s ad campaign? Which qualities of Italy’s ski resorts would an effective ad highlight? How might the campaign address the problems described in the article?

Provide students with markers and poster board or chart paper. Display the completed posters in the classroom, giving students time to examine them. Start a discussion by asking: What makes these ads effective, and why? What changes would you make, in order to make these ads more effective?

A bank run caused Silicon Valley Bank to fail. The U.S. government took over to prevent a financial crisis.

SOCIAL STUDIES (NCSS) STANDARD: People, Places, and Environments

COMMON CORE (CCSS) STANDARDS: RI.6–8.1, RI.6–8.3, RI.6–8.8, SL.6–8.1

BEFORE READING

Test your students' financial literacy. Ask: What's the purpose of a bank? What does a bank do with the money you deposit? How do banks make money? (Banks invest money to make a profit.) What are the benefits of investing money? What are the potential dangers? (People invest their money in hopes of making more money. The danger is that investments might lose their value.) Tell students that they'll read about a bank that suffered one of the costs of investing.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Why did Silicon Valley Bank fail? What made customers lose trust in the bank?
- Tell students that SVB made risky investments. Ask: Why did the U.S. government take over the bank? Do you think the government should save banks that make risky investments? Why or why not?
- What are interest rates? Do you think these are good or bad for investors? Explain.

BEFORE READING

Ask students: What skills would you expect to be necessary in designing video games? Explain. Why do you think game design is a hot industry now? Would you be interested in this industry? Why or why not?

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Khandaker says a game designer could be “someone who loves painting or writing stories, or making music, or even just listening to music.” How would a love for these things make a good game designer? How could storytelling help in creating good video games? Is it useful in any other job? Explain.

CLOSING ACTIVITY

Challenge students to create an outline for their own video game. Have them watch a Roblox game designer explain the fundamental structure of any video game, the core loop, [here](#). Once they have the basic structure of their game, students can design the world in which their game will take place, and the characters that will inhabit it.
