

# TRASH OR TREASURE?



## CREATIVE CRABS

Hermit crabs in the wild are ditching their shells and finding new homes—in our plastic litter.

**LEXILE:** 1060L (900L alternate reading level)

**SCIENCE (NGSS) STANDARD:** Earth and Human Activity

**COMMON CORE (CCSS) STANDARDS:** RI.6-8.1, RI.6-8.3, RI.6-8.6, RI.6-8.7

## ENGAGE THE READER

Start the lesson with a scavenger hunt. Have students walk around the room or the school and note all the things they can find that are made of plastic. Bring students back together and have them share a few things from their notes. Then prompt a discussion with the following question: How has plastic affected the world? Highlight some positive and negative responses. Then show students the cover of *Trash or Treasure?* and have them share their reactions before reading.

## QUESTIONS FOR CLOSE READING AND DISCUSSION

- Why are hermit crabs using trash as shells?
- What is the overall tone of this article?
- What is iEcology? What are some benefits and drawbacks?
- What fact(s) from this article do you find most surprising? Why?

## EXTEND LEARNING

Reread the paragraph before the section “New Homes” aloud. Explain that there’s a system for dating events on a timeline going back to Earth’s beginnings. It’s called the geologic timescale, and it’s broken down into lengths of time such as eras, periods, and epochs. Have students learn about these time periods on the National Park Service website [here](#). Read through the timeline as a class. Check for understanding with questions about different eras and events, and how long ago they occurred. Show them the illustration by Ray Troll to aid understanding ([ti.me/AgesOfRock](http://ti.me/AgesOfRock)). Then discuss as a class which geologic era we are currently in and whether our impact on the Earth is great enough to qualify as a new epoch.

Return to the quote from Zuzanna Jagiello about a hermit crab in a plastic shell being an icon of our time. Invite students to research and share another image that helps define the period in which we’re living.

## LEARNING THE LINGO

### ESSENTIAL QUESTIONS

- What are some words that journalists use in their work?
- How can understanding journalists' vocabulary help us better understand journalism?

### INTRODUCTION

Have students share some vocabulary and definitions they've learned in the previous four lessons. List these on the board. Explain that they'll be assessing their knowledge of these terms and learning about additional journalist vocabulary. Provide students with the "Vocabulary Self-Assessment" chart ([ti.me/newsVocab](https://ti.me/newsVocab)). Open the "Newsroom Lingo" slide deck from the News Literacy Project ([ti.me/lingoSlides](https://ti.me/lingoSlides)) and go through the first two slides. For the second slide, have students use the sheet to assess their understanding of some key terms in previous lessons. Then go through the slides of new terms and have students assess their understanding as you introduce these terms.

### SMALL GROUP WORK

Have students work in groups and go through the TIME Edge website and see if they can apply their knowledge of these terms by finding some examples. Then bring the class together and ask groups to share what they found. Then ask: How can we tell if one of these writers has a beat? (Hint: Try googling Jeffrey Kluger.) Ask students to consider how understanding these terms helps them better understand journalism. Invite them to share their thoughts.
