Penniless!

ENGAGE THE READER

Get ready for this lesson by creating a winter market in your classroom. Set up booths selling such things as books, school supplies, and snacks. Price these items with an amount that ends in 99¢ (e.g., \$1.99, \$5.99). Assign several students to be vendors, and provide them with change, including a limited number of pennies (four or five). The rest of the students will be shoppers. Give them \$20 to spend at the shops. Note what vendors do when they run out of change. Don't provide guidance. Then have students read "Penniless!"

QUESTIONS FOR CLOSE READING AND DISCUSSION

- Why are pennies no longer being produced? What might be the impact of this?
- When was the last time you used a penny? Does this affect your opinion about the discontinuation of pennies?
- Do you think this event is newsworthy? Explain.

EXTEND LEARNING

After reading, have a discussion about what vendors and shoppers did when there were no more pennies to give as change. Did vendors offer more change? Did they ask a neighboring vendor? Did shoppers offer to accept less change? Talk about why businesses would like guidance from the government, and what students think good guidance would be. Then take a class poll to see who thinks discontinuing the penny is a good idea.

Point out that there will still be limited batches of pennies made for collectors. Have students consider what occasions these pennies might be minted for, and what design they might feature. Have students research the history of pennies to learn about how they changed over time. Then they can design their own collector penny. They should write a paragraph or two explaining their design's meaning and why it would appeal to collectors.
